Donohues may have violated ethics rules

Paul Eysie's request for a change in zoning to his property at 1237-1243 Washington St. was narrowly defeated on the floor of Town Meeting on Monday evening. However, his efforts for the zoning change commenced months before the Monday vote, and included meetings in front of both the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen.

Paul Donohue, a member of the Planning Board, and Helen Abdallah Donohue, his wife and a member of the Board of Selectmen were both vocal opponents of Eysie's request, and in being so may have violated conflict of interest rules established by the Massachusetts Ethics Commission.

Eysie approached the Planning Board requesting his zoning change be placed on the Town Meeting Warrant. Donohue strongly voiced opposition to the request and was instrumental in the board voting against it being put to a vote at Town Meeting.

Eysie's next step was before the Board of Selectmen asking if they would approve his request be placed on the Warrant. Despite Abdallah Donohue's vociferous arguments against it, Selectmen voted to place it on the warrant with only one dissenting vote, that of Abdallah Donohue.

At no time did either Paul Donohue or Helen Abdallah Donohue state to anyone that their family owns property in close proximity to Eysie's,

and neither of them filed disclosure statements regarding the potential conflict, as is required by the ethics commission. The family property is located at 1223 Washington St., approximately 120 feet from the Eysie property.

When Abdallah Donohue was asked about the potential conflict, she said, there was never a conflict of interest and therefore, disclosures were not necessary.

"I'm not a direct abutter, I don't even own the property, my family does," she said. "It doesn't have anything to do with the Eysie property."

However, the state may disagree. According to the ethics commission, direct ownership isn't required, nor is a direct abutment of another property necessary for a conflict to exist. The language is as follows:

"Under the conflict of interest law, a property owner is presumed to have a financial interest in matters affecting abutting and nearby property. Thus, unless she can clearly demonstrate that she does not have a financial interest, a public employee should not take any action in her official capacity on matters affecting property that is near or directly abuts her own property [and] property owned by any immediate family member."

The commission also stated: "The following factors are considered to determine whether, in a particular situation, a person or organization has a financial interest in an

Moderna TIF passes, Eysie zoning article fails

Paul Eysie, owner of 1237-1243 Washington St., was eight votes away from having his property rezoned exclusively for commercial use.

During the first session of the Special Town Meeting on Oct. 24, 94 Town Meeting members voted in Eysie's favor, while 58 voted against the proposal. This caused Article Four to narrowly miss the two-thirds vote it needed to pass.

Before the vote, Attorney David Hern, representing Eysie, said that despite the

split zoning, commercial taxes have paid on the 42,000 square-foot parcel since the plaza was built in 1971.

"The building itself is located entirely in the general residence zone," said Hern, adding that the use variance was originally approved 45 years ago by the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA).

Hern also continued to quell rumors that the process was rushed and deceptive.

"There's been no deception practiced by Mr. Eysie or anyone else," he said.

Hern also dispelled speculation that Eysie was planning

to build an apartment building on the site.

"He couldn't even do it anyway without Zoning Board approval," said Hern. "Some people think this is an intrusion into the residential zone. This is not an intrusion; this property has been there for 45 years."

Because of the split zoning, Hern said that Eysie and his tenants have had to go before the ZBA whenever they wanted to change something. He said that ongoing requirement could easily be a deter-

Schools' new program appears to be reaping benefits

Proficient PARCC scores up 18 percent in fourth grade math

Following last year's implementation of enVisionMATH Common Core, the number of fourth grade students to earn proficient-level scores on the math section of the PARCC test went from 54 percent last year to 72 percent this year.

"That's an 18 percent jump, that's remarkable, you really want to go out and whoop it up," said Assistant Superintendent Dr. Alexander Wyeth during the Oct. 19 School Committee meeting. "These tests are more demanding; they expect more from our students in terms of critical think-

ing."

Although this is the second year that PARCC has been administered in Norwood, the MCAS was still used for fifth and eighth grade science, ninth and tenth grade biology, tenth grade math and English Language Arts (ELA) as well as ninth and tenth grade science.

In addition to their 18-point improvement, Norwood fourth graders trounced the state's 2015 figure of 48 percent.

Wyeth said state-level PARCC results could not be tabulated this year as 72 percent of students across Massachusetts took the PARCC while 28 percent took the MCAS causing an

"uneven distribution."

Fifth grade students showed improvement on the ELA section with 76 percent hitting the proficient level, compared to 69 percent over last year. They also easily surpassed last year's state total of 63 percent.

Although the fifth grade math scores climbed by 10 percent from 48 percent to 58 percent, Norwood only edged the state by 3 percent.

Member Michele Eysie-Mullen also raised concerns about the fifth grade math scores at Balch Elementary School, as

abutting or nearby property. A financial interest is presumed whenever her property is directly opposite a street, public way or private way, or she is an abutter to an abutter within 300 feet of the property line. Not only must a public employee abstain from voting when he has a conflict of interest, he may not participate in any official discussion of the matter. Ordinarily, the best course of action is simply to leave the room during the deliberation and vote of the board.”

Donohue Eysie said, “I still question whether or not there could be the appearance of a conflict of interest,” he said. “A public official who owns abutting or nearby property is required to remove themselves, never mind entering into discussion and voting on a matter.”

Finally, the state defines a public employee as, “ both elected and appointed state, county and municipal employees, whether paid or unpaid, full-time or part-time. An unpaid volunteer board member as well as, in some instances, a consultant who is a contractor are considered public employees for purposes of the conflict of interest law.

Attorney David Hern, representing Mr. Eysie in the matter before the town said that while there could have been a conflict with Donohue and Abdallah Donohue voting on their respective boards, no wrongdoing was committed during the Special Town Meeting when Abdallah Donohue voted as a Town Meeting member.

“There’s no issue about her voting as a Town Meeting member,” said Hern.

When asked about a potential conflict existing with the actions of Paul and Helen

Hern also said that he and Eysie do not plan on pressing the matter any further.

“It’s not something that Mr. Eysie or I are concerned with,” he said.

Norwood Light reports all is well after lightning strike

James Collins, superintendent of the Light Department, assured the Board of Selectmen that the Norwood cable antennas are functional once again despite being struck by lightning last weekend.

Collins said the strike occurred in the Westover Parkway area last Saturday night and the effects continued into Sunday morning.

"There were several transformers that were knocked out of power," he said during the board's Oct. 25 meeting.

However, Collins said his team was able to restore the cable signal by manually pointing the antennas toward Providence, just in time for residents to watch the New England Patriots take on the Pittsburgh Steelers.

"We got it right up before the game," said Broadband Manager Darryl Hanson, adding that the strike was a rare occurrence.

"These channels, in the past 15 years, have probably gone down three times," he said.

Hanson said the problem could be solved with a direct fiber feed. However, at \$25,000 per month, the service has been deemed cost-prohibitive for the town.

Chairman Allan Howard lauded Collins and Hanson for how well they handled the outage.

"There were quite a few comments on local media, 'what's wrong with Norwood cable,'" he said. "It's nice how you guys adjusted to it on the fly."

Hanson also said there will be upgrades to the town's Internet and video services, adding that there was a noticeable difference after the analog format was jettisoned.

"That really made a lot of room," he said. Hanson said he does not expect any major interruptions during the upgrades, however, he said the Light Department will send out notifications should that change.

Collins also provided an update on the 115 Kilovolt Transmission Line Replacement Project.

He said the two new lines are now in service and the contractor will be removing the old line and wires, which traverse Interstate 95. Collins said that work is scheduled to take place during the morning hours on Oct. 30.

In addition, Collins addressed concerns about the town's upcoming switch to an Advanced Metering Infrastructure.

"Some people are concerned that they're going to get a greater meter charge when we go to the new system and that's not the case," he said. "The new meters will be 100 percent accurate."

He said residents will receive a letter in the mail the week before the installations, which are scheduled to begin on Oct. 31. Residents will also receive a door hanger once the meter has been installed.

However, Collins did ask that residents clear the area where the new meter will be installed.

"People don't think of bushes being a problem, but it is when you're reading a meter every month," he said.

Selectman Thomas Mahoney said he was impressed with the number of businesses that have subscribed to Norwood Light.

Collins credited his marketing team with that success.

"They work very hard, they're very motivated individuals," he said.

In other news, Mark Ryan, director of the Department of Public Works (DPW), said a brick walkway is being put in at Aaron Guild Park.

In addition to brick being more durable, Ryan said it is also more aesthetically appealing.

"In our opinion, the brick was more attractive," he said. "It's a beautiful addition to the park."

Crews have also "aerated, seeded, top-dressed and fertilized" the rectangular and baseball fields at Coakley

Middle School.

Speaking about the town's water system, Ryan told the selectmen that the same crisis that struck Flint, Michigan in April 2014 would not happen in Norwood.

"Lead is not an issue in this town," he said, adding

Abundant Table's future in doubt following eviction

For the past eight years, the Abundant Table has been a haven for those in need.

However, at the end of September the organization's officers were given 60 days to vacate their rented space at the First Congregational Church.

This may cause the group to cease operations.

Abundant Table President Aislynn Rodeghiero said she was "shocked and confused" when she read the Sept. 29 letter from Ed DeJesus, chairman of the church's Board of Trustees, particularly after she met with one of the board members two weeks prior.

"I used that time to ask if we were in good standing – they gave no indication," said Rodeghiero. "It was a gut

punch thinking of what it will do to our guests. The holidays are so hard for our folks, but I guess that's our problem."

Rodeghiero said DeJesus did not give a reason for terminating the three-year Use Agreement, which was valid through March 2017.

"I had to probe for a reason," she said. "We were asked

to leave based on a personality conflict.”

After receiving the letter, Rodeghiero feverishly began looking for a new location. She said space at St. Catherine’s Church, the Knights of Columbus and Grace Episcopal Church were early possibilities she looked into, and this would keep the Abundant Table in Norwood.

However, she soon discovered that none of the prospective locations had the space or the equipment to meet the needs of her group.

“It was a much harder task than I ever thought,” said Rodeghiero, adding that finances quickly became a factor as well. “We’re a non-profit. We just don’t have money pouring out of our ears.”

After meeting with her Executive Board to discuss the situation, Rodeghiero said it was clear that there was no way out.

“We have exhausted liter-

ally every option, it’s tragic – it’s beyond upsetting,” she said. “As of Jan. 1 [2017], Abundant Table will be no more.”

Following Thanksgiving, which will be “Abundant Table’s final meal,” Rodeghiero said the organization will continue its box lunch delivery service for approximately 50 people until the end of the year.

“The people we deliver to really, really need the meals,” she said. “They’re the ones that really break my heart in all of this.”

In response, DeJesus said he wrote the termination letter with the hope that the Abundant Table would find a location that was more accommodating than the church.

“They do terrific and important work, they’re a value to the community,” he said, adding that a number of parishioners had volunteered with the organization. “They deserve a space better suited to their needs.”

However, he said the board

did not attempt to assist Rodeghiero with finding a new location.

“We wish them well, but I don’t know if that would’ve been appropriate,” he said. “I don’t know how that would’ve been received.”

DeJesus also said a 30-day notice was all that was needed for either party to terminate the Use Agreement.

In addition, he said it is unlikely that the Abundant Table will respond with legal action.

“We don’t anticipate any of that,” he said.

According to its website, the Abundant Table was established in November 2003 and moved to the church five years later. The organization has served meals twice a week to 60-80 less fortunate residents from Norwood, Walpole, Canton, Westwood and Dedham.

that Norwood’s water is tested on a weekly basis.

Although there is always room for improvement, Ryan said the town is fortunate to get its water from the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA).

“The MWRA provides impeccable water,” he said.

Selectman Paul Bishop said he appreciated the DPW’s efforts to keep the water clean.

“We have a pristine water system, I don’t think a lot of people appreciate that,” he said.

In providing an update on the Cemetery Department, Ryan said Old Parish Cemetery is still maintained on a regular basis despite being locked.

“There’s really some great Norwood history there,” he said.

He also said a number of new trees have been planted including Red Maples, Eastern White Pines, Norway Spruces and Green Giant Arborvitaes.

Looking at the Engineering Department, Ryan told the selectmen that six-and-a-half miles of sidewalks have been resurfaced and that grass strips have been “loamed and seeded.”

He also said the DPW and the Engineering Department have assisted the Board of Health with installing signage for the Norwood Walks program.

FlightLevel lobbies for three lease extensions

The Airport Commission voted unanimously to acknowledge notification of extending the leases on lots 6 and 7 to 2047 and to extend the lease of Lot 5 to 2050.

During the Oct. 19 meeting, Peter Eichleay, president of FlightLevel Aviation, said lease extensions for the three lots would be necessary for FlightLevel to complete construction of its six-unit hangar complex.

"We're hoping to be completed within six to eight weeks," he said, adding that the construction will be done in a strategic manner. "All the material is going to arrive in stages."

The leases for lots 6 and 7 were originally set to expire in 2026.

Eichleay said the total size of the complex will be 20,385 square feet and will be funded by a \$2.5 million investment from FlightLevel.

"This process started back in 2014," said Eichleay. "With the amount of money going into it, that's the impetus for the lease extension."

He also said FlightLevel has met both conditions set forth by the commission.

Eichleay said the first condition was to begin construction of

the hangar complex by 2017. The second condition was to have the sublease for Lot 5 reviewed by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), also by 2017.

Eichleay said he is also planning to tear down and rebuild the T-hangars.

He told the commission that over the past two years, FlightLevel has invested more than \$3 million into improving the airport. With more projects in the works, Eichleay said he plans on investing another \$3 million by 2022.

Since Lot 6 will be used for fueling, Vice Chairman Michael Sheehan said the project's fueling plan would need to be approved by an engineer before it can be included in the overall site plan.

However, Sheehan had no other concerns.

"It's exciting, there's some really good things going on," he said.

Chairman Mark Ryan said the airport still offers "favorable lease rates" as there would only be a 2 percent increase from \$.47 to \$.56 per square foot by 2026.

In other news, Jeffrey Adler, senior project manager for Dubois and King, provided an update on the relocation of Taxiway A. He said the final paperwork was submitted through the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act and expects to receive feedback by Nov. 23 and have the final certification

issued by Dec. 5.

"That pretty much completes Phase One," said Adler. "It's a major hurdle, getting through that finally."

Once the final certification is granted, he said the permitting process can begin on the project itself. He also said a Notice of Intent will need to be filed as well.

Adler said the permitting process will last until the end of 2017; therefore, construction is expected to begin by the summer of 2018.

Airport Manager Russell Maguire said the FAA reconsidered and removed the Operational Agreement that was originally included in the Memorandum of Agreement. He said the Operational Agreement had stated that it was the town's responsibility to renovate the air traffic control tower.

"The concern was the town of Norwood would face unforeseen financial obligations to upgrade the air traffic control tower," said Maguire.

However, after further discussions with the FAA, Maguire said it was determined that the tower is owned by the Federal Government.

Maguire also said he intends to apply for an Airport Safety Management grant to fund new markings on the runways. He anticipates that project will begin by late spring or early summer of next year.





Volleyball setting up for tournament run

After seeing its seven-match winning streak snapped last week, Norwood jumped right back into the win column with a 3-1 victory over Sharon on Monday.

The win, which improved the Mustangs to 14-4 overall, gives them an inside track at both a Bay State Conference - Herget Division title and a home game in the Division 2 South tournament, which will begin next week.

"This week is huge on both ends," Norwood head coach Paul Nimblett said after the match vs. the Eagles. "The Herget [title] is right there; us and Walpole are neck and neck. As far as a home game, that's something we're working towards. I know it's definitely a possibility. It all comes down to this week and also what happens with other teams.

"If we take care of what we need to take care of, we're con-

fidant that it's definitely a possibility."

The Mustangs took the first two sets, 25-20 and 25-16, respectively. Sharon lingered in the first set, with a tied score as late as 16-16, and were able to get within a point at 21-20. Off an Ally Copponi kill, however, Krista Bradley was able to serve out the remainder of the set for the win, notching one ace in the run.

Bradley, the Herget Division's leading server, finished with nine service points, four aces and seven kills.

The Eagles controlled the tempo throughout set three, never trailing by more than two points early on and pulling ahead for good after a 15-15 tie. They'd wind up with a 25-19 advantage to make it a 2-1 match.

"In the third set I kind of flipped the lineup around, tried a few different things," Nimblett said. "It was Sharon's senior night, and they were playing to win, so they got that set from us.

But we turned back into playing at a high level in that fourth set to close it out."

The Mustangs comfortably controlled the fourth and final set to seal the win, 25-16, with Kiki Ryan closing out the match on serving run. Ryan led Norwood with 18 service points, eight as-

sists and 12 kills.

"She's been playing well the whole season, but definitely turning it on at the end," Nimblett said of Ryan.

The win closed out the nonleague portion of the Mustangs' schedule at a perfect 4-0, with sweeps of both Sharon

(Hockomock) and the Randolph Blue Devils (South Shore League). Norwood won 12 of 13 sets in nonleague play, its lone loss the third set vs. Sharon on Monday.

The Mustangs finish off the regular season today at Walpole at 5 p.m.

Football falls back into the playoffs

Back to the playoffs it is for the Norwood football team, even after last weekend's 28-14 loss to the Natick Redhawks dropped them to 3-4.

In a game suspended on Friday night due to lightning strikes, the Herget Division rivals resumed play on Saturday afternoon at 3 p.m. - roughly 20 hours after the initial kickoff - with 2:43 to go in the first quarter and the Redhawks on top 7-0.

Despite winning the turnover battle 3-0 - with two turnovers going for Mustang touchdowns - Norwood couldn't match Natick's offensive rhythm, and the Mustangs were held without an offensive touchdown for the third time in their last four games.

"We got killed by the big play early," Norwood head coach Jim Tighe said on Saturday afternoon. "The kids played hard, they worked hard and they stayed in it. One of these times it's going to pop in our direction."

Already on top 21-0, Natick took control of the ball at the Norwood 45 with 23 seconds to

go in the first half. After a 7-yard gain through the air, Malik Williams picked up 20 yards on the ground to put the Redhawks on the brink of field goal range.

They passed up the chance at three points for a shot at the end zone, a decision which proved costly when Tony Ortega came up with Christian D'Antonio's throw, zigging and zagging his way 95 yards for a Mustangs touchdown as time expired in the first half.

Ortega's big play acumen continued into the third quarter, when he caught a pair of passes from Colin Plasko for a combined 54 yards. But the gains couldn't translate to more points, as the Mustang offense again sputtered out.

"Tony is a good athlete," Tighe said of the junior. "He's open a lot, we've just got to give Colin time to throw the ball and Colin's got to be accurate enough to get him the ball."

Three plays into the ensuing Natick drive, D'Antonio hit David Carey for a 69-yard touchdown pass to make it 28-7 Redhawks.

Norwood would punt on its

next drive, but came up with another defensive touchdown courtesy of Coleman Ivory's 70-yard interception return to get the game to its final score, 28-14.

"It's not an effort thing," Tighe said of coming up short. "We played well in spots, we just got killed by the big play and all of a sudden we're down three touchdowns. Then you have to deviate from what you're trying to do."

Tighe also downplayed the notion having to come back to Natick on Saturday afternoon after playing roughly 10 minutes of football on Friday night had anything to do with the result.

"I wish we could have played it last night but I understand what the deal was," he said. "It's just like a Saturday game."

Playoff picture

Through seven games, 2016 has been the identical twin of the 2015 edition of the Mustangs. A 3-0 start vs. Framingham, Wayland and Dedham, succeeded by a four-game losing skid vs. Walpole, Milton, Wellesley and Natick.

The sub-.500 record was enough to get the Mustangs back

Norwood nabs playoff spot, avoids do-or-die vs. Walpole

Norwood snapped a four-game losing streak in last Thursday's 1-1 tie vs. the Newton North Tigers, setting the stage for the final week of the regular season.

Facing the Milton Wildcats on the road on Tuesday, the Mustangs sorely needed a win to avoid a literal must-win scenario vs. the Walpole Porkers today.

Deciding it was left best to not tempt those fates, it was a pair of senior captains who led Norwood to a 2-0 road victory over Milton, clinching a sixth straight playoff berth in the process.

"It's awesome, the girls are really excited," Mustangs interim coach Caitlin Nottebart said after the game.

Deadlocked 0-0 at the half, first Coley Hayes and then Cassidy Mahoney scored to propel Norwood to an 8-7-2 record, assuring themselves no worse than a .500 record.

"The seniors stepped up today, I'm really happy for them," Nottebart said. "They really didn't want their season to end on Thursday, so it's pretty exciting."

A tie against the Wildcats would have left the Mustangs needing a tie at worst today at home vs. the Porkers, something Norwood hasn't done since 2014.

A loss vs. Milton, and the Mustangs would have needed to beat Walpole outright - which hasn't been done since 2002.

"They're obviously going to play very hard, but knowing that it's not be-all end-all against a team they lost to 12-2, I think is definitely a weight off their shoulders," Nottebart said, referring to Norwood's first matchup with the Porkers this season on Sept. 22 in Walpole.

"I also think they're pretty pumped up now," Nottebart said. "They know they're playing Walpole on grass, so I think they have this mentality going forward they may be in this game. So I think they're pretty excited to play Walpole on Thursday on senior day."

Last week vs. Newton North, Katie Mulligan's tally 6:16 into the first half gave the Mustangs their first goal since Oct. 7 vs. Needham, snap-

ping a 13-day span off the scoreboard. After Hayes had scored to make it 1-0 Norwood that day, the Mustangs would fall 4-1 to the Rockets and go on to lose their next three contests as well, all via shut-out.

"That was our first goal in four games," Nottebart said. "We've been really working at practice on scoring. We have such young, really talented forwards; I think that's where the trouble lies, is that they're really young."

Mulligan's second goal of the season came off a corner, part of a strong opening stretch by the Mustangs. On Newton North's first corner chance, Bryn Garczynski jumped up through the circle for a steal atop the zone, sending a vertical pass upwards to Allie McDonough, who sent it even further up field for Rachel Noah.

The bid came up short, but it was along the lines of a more wide-open attack Nottebart is hoping the Mustangs can play with down the home stretch in a 3-3-3-1 alignment.

"It just gives us a little bit more offense, where we're kind of struggling on that end," Nottebart said, adding shooting is an area the team needs to work on as well.

"They're shooting at the goalie instead of around the goalie, so that's what we've been working on in practice."

The Tigers scored their lone goal of the game at 8:59 of the second half, also off a corner.

Each team traded chances in the waning minutes, with Newton North having a crucial corner opportunity with 20 seconds left in regulation, but the Norwood defense stepped up and preserved the much-needed point in the standings.

"Our defense has been solid," Nottebart said. "They adjusted to Newton North because they send almost the entire team up there on offense. We're used to having to cover four girls in the circle; they're sending about nine, so that was a big adjustment."

The Mustangs had 11 corners in the game, compared to 12 for the Tigers. Newton North had back-to-back corners to end the first half, the second of which came after Norwood failed to clear and the Tigers were granted an extra attempt despite no time on the clock.

Nottebart subbing for Doliner as field hockey season comes to a head

With Allison Doliner out on maternity leave, the reigns of the Norwood field hockey team have been given to junior varsity coach Caitlin Nottebart.

Initially, assistant Jaclyn Germano was supposed to take over for Doliner after she gave birth on Oct. 16. But when Germano's schedule became complicated by a new job at Milton High School, the interim coaching job flipped from an alumna of one Norwood rival (Germano attended Westwood High School) to another: Nottebart, who is a graduate of the Walpole Porkers field hockey team.

"It'll be exciting playing Walpole, with all the people I know," Nottebart said after the Newton North game, alluding Norwood's regular season finale.

A special education instructor at Norwood High, Nottebart graduated from Walpole in 2002 - where she won a state championship with the Porkers as a senior - and from UMass-Dartmouth in 2006, where she won Little East Conference Defensive Player of the Year honors, also as a senior.

She played both left and center back at Walpole and sweeper at UMD, giving her plenty of experience on the ins and outs of the defensive side of the field.

With Doliner herself a former defender at Norwood and later at Merrimack, Nottebart is happy to have Germano still assisting her; the

former Wolverine, who was a teammate of Doliner's at Merrimack, played forward.

"We focus on defense a lot, which is why it's great when Jaclyn does get here, because she was a forward," Nottebart said. "When we have Jaclyn, we can focus on the forwards."

Nottebart, who's in her third year with the Mustangs program overall, said that knowing the majority of the roster from when they were JV players has helped a lot.

Still, changing coaches roughly three-quarters of the way through the season can be tough to adapt to, something which she acknowledged.

"It's been a little hard just transitioning with the girls - and they're really excited for Al [Doliner] - but a little nervous I think to have somebody new," Nottebart said. "We've been trying to just keep it up and work hard."

Nottebart said the team was able to FaceTime with Doliner and her son, Nolan - "our newest Mustang," Nottebart said - and that the captains were able to go over and meet the baby in person.

Schematically, the Mustangs will be going with a more conventional 3-3-3-1 look under Nottebart, with the hopes of creating more offense. The decision was made after the first half in Nottebart's debut vs. Natick last Tuesday, a 1-0 loss.

"We went back in the second half [vs. Natick] to 3-3-3-1, so that's how we played today [vs. Newton North], 3-3-3-1,"

Nottebart said. "It just gives us a little bit more offense, where we're kind of struggling on that end. Our midfielders have been able to follow in because they know where they're supposed to be.

"They've been really good with the adjustments; they're really coachable."

Doliner said it's great to have Nottebart filling in for her, noting her field hockey pedigree from her playing days.

"Caitlin is awesome," Doliner said. "She played under legendary coach Penny Calf [at Walpole] and then at UMass-Dartmouth, so it's great to have her perspective coming from two solid programs."

In addition to Germano, who is helping out whenever she can, freshman coach/Norwood alumna Emily Whitney has also been aiding Nottebart.

"They've gone above and beyond for the program this year and I'm so thankful to have them on my staff," Doliner said.

Nottebart will enjoy the rest of this season, and however far the Mustangs can make a run in the Division 1 South tournament. But she'll be more than happy to relinquish her role back to Doliner next fall.

"I enjoy being Allison's assistant in Norwood," Nottebart said in regards to potentially becoming a varsity head coach some day. "I really enjoyed playing and I love coaching, but I don't see myself taking over a program anywhere anytime soon."

spite identical 3-4 records.

Norwood will travel to Cape Cod to take on the top-seeded Falmouth Clippers (7-0, 22.57) on Friday night at 7 p.m.

The Atlantic Coast League champions present a stark contrast from last year's playoff opponent for Norwood based on one simple factor: familiarity, or a lack thereof. The Mustangs opened at Milton

last year, a team they face every year.

Other Division 2A South matchups include: No. 2 Westwood (5-2) vs. No. 7 Somerset-Berkley (5-2); No. 3 Silver Lake (6-1) vs. No. 6 Scituate (5-2); and No. 4 Medfield (5-2) vs. No. 5 Milton (5-2).

From the Bay State Conference, Newton North (6-1) Braintree and Needham (each 4-3) made the

postseason in the Division 1 South field; Wellesley (7-0) and Natick (6-1) each qualified for the postseason as part of the Division 1A South bracket; and Walpole (3-4) qualified in the Division 2 South bracket.

rent for someone else.

"That discourages people from improving property," said Hern.

Selectman Helen Abdallah Donohue spoke in opposition, saying there are considerable differences between residential and commercial zoning.

"Use variances are not allowed in the town of Norwood at this time," she said.

Donohue also said the commercial tax rate has not created any hardship for Eysie over the years.

"The property has been used as a business since the '70s," she said, adding that Eysie's proposal would "hurt" the abutters. "Although he's been paying commercial taxes on it, he's been collecting commercial rents on it."

However, Donohue said she trusted that Town Meeting would act in the best interest of the neighbors.

"Town Meeting sticks up for other neighborhoods," she said.

Resident Michael Saad said Eysie's rezoning proposal would give way to something

much larger.

"It's going to be a mega project," he said. "For someone to build a wall 11 feet above the storefront – something's wrong."

Resident Danielle Tinlin reported property damage from a trash vehicle going to and from Eysie's property.

"I can't tell you how many times that trash truck has damaged our fence," she said, adding that neither Eysie nor his family ever offered to pay for the damages. "There have been nothing but broken promises – I'm concerned for this project – please don't let this project go through."

Although he "did not have a dog in the fight," District 6 Town Meeting Member John Hall said he would vote in Eysie's favor, as he did not completely understand why abutters were opposed.

Ernie Paciorkowski, vice chairman of the Planning Board, said he could not support the article because of the future possibility that the land could be sold and subsequently used for more invasive pur-

poses.

"The zoning stays with the land no matter who the owner is," he said.

Out of the five articles that were taken up during meeting, Article Four was the only one that did not pass.

The town's tax increment financing (TIF) agreement with Moderna Therapeutics had a much better outcome with unanimous passage.

Town Planner Paul Halkiotis said the Cambridge-based company will open its new facility at 100 Tech Dr. and plans to spend \$110 million on personal property and construction costs.

He said that after being vacant for three years, approximately 94,000 square feet of the current structure is being razed while the remaining space will be renovated for biotechnology.

"This will put the property back into a positive tax revenue for the town," said Halkiotis.

He said the TIF itself will give Moderna a 40 percent tax exemption over 10 years. This

will still provide the town with \$253,237 per annum in tax revenue.

Halkiotis said that when the TIF expires, annual taxes from Moderna are projected to increase to \$700,000.

During her presentation, Maren Winnick of Moderna's Investor Relations Department said the company is delving into a "new area of innovation" with messenger RNA (mRNA). She said this is a cutting-edge medical technology designed to develop personalized vaccines for diseases such as the Zika virus and possibly cancer.

"We have 200 employees dedicated just to advancing mRNA science," said Winnick. "We don't really know where

the boundaries are for mRNA science."

Senior Vice President Stephen Harbin said the facility will operate under the regulations of Biosafety Level (BSL) One.

"We don't anticipate any impact on the community," he said. "It's consistent with the work we do in Cambridge."

District 8 Town Meeting Member Edward Ferris said no live viruses are permitted under BSL One.

"It's technically safer than going to your doctor's office," he said.

The second session of the Special Town Meeting is scheduled for Oct. 27 at 7:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

37 percent of the school's fifth graders received proficient scores.

In contrast, the combined average of the other elementary schools was 63.5 percent.

"Grade five is a huge concern for the Balch," said Eysie-Mullen. "Is there something we can do to help those teachers out?"

On the seventh grade ELA section, 67 percent of students scored proficiently. However, this is the third year in a row in which that percentage has declined.

"We would like to see that back in the high-70 proficiency rates," said Wyeth.

On the science section of the MCAS, 56 percent of Norwood's fifth grade students achieved proficient level scores and topped the state's total of 47 percent.

However, Wyeth said that part of the MCAS needs to be revamped.

"It's not a great test," he said.

The proficient ninth and tenth grade biology scores were at 87 percent this year, representing a 7 percent climb over last year. Norwood's scores also coasted past the state's total of 75 percent.

Wyeth also said that the district is currently at a Level Two designation by the State Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

However, he said there is no problem with being at Level Two.

"Fifty percent of the schools in the state are at Level Two," he said.

In other news, the committee voted 3-2 not to hire an outside search consultant to assist in the superintendent search.

Instead, the committee will use the "Massachusetts Association of School Committees with Tech Support."

Prior to the vote, Chairman James Gormley urged the committee to vote the other way.

"For \$9,500, that is a relatively small piece of our budget," he said. "Using a consultant is worth the money."

Member Myev Bodenhofer agreed with having professional guidance.

"I would feel a lot more comfortable knowing a professional was in the room," she said, adding that an error on the part of the committee could be far more costly than \$9,500.

"This is the number one thing."

Member Lisa Igoe said she was not pleased with the results of the Operational and Efficiency Evaluation, which was conducted in April 2015.

"We owe it to the budget to give it a shot with the tech support," she said. "I'm not all about the consultants."

Eysie-Mullen said anyone who volunteers for the Superintendent Search Committee will be serious and devoted to the process.

"We've had a revolving door of superintendents and we have had consultants," she said.

"It's going to work out and it's going to be awesome, you've got to have the confidence."

In addition, Glenn Koocher, executive director of the Massachusetts Association of School Committees, had suggested that Gormley be on the search committee.

However, Gormley disagreed.

"For personal reasons, I'm not going to do that," he said.

Instead, the committee voted unanimously to have Igoe and Eysie-Mullen sit on the search committee.
